Mountain Scene by Chris Prudden

he seasonal change for Mt Egmont is different every year, and we havent seen so much snow fall on the Big E in April for a few. Its certainly fair to say the very active group are keen for a change of environment and activities, so get out your warm gear and hardware, winter is here!

In past years I would have seen mice appearing in my locker at Tahurangi Lodge, their arrival was always a clear signal that the first major snow fall was not far away. This year not one has showed up, maybe our eradication process has worked, however I found thier presence a warm reminder that fauna can and does survive in an environment sadly devoid of indigenous animal life.

ACTIVITIES (as reported)

A relatively quiet month with a few items of interest.

SUMMIT ASCENTS

North Ridge- Davo Bolger, Chris Prudden and 2 clients, very cold conditions on snow from North Egmont. Deep snow via Crater Valley about minus 10 deg. C on top.

<u>Surrey Road-</u> Plumber McLean twice on different weekends. Hoffos with a variation of steep bouldering on Blondies Ramp.

Blondies Bluff-Davo Bolger and Guido Prudden starting via the ramp and on to the main cliff directly below Surrey. Davo led the first pitch on a rising traverse with a necky move above big air and a possible serious pendulum. The second fared slightly better locating a hidden under cling but the pendulum remained threatening. Sparse pro and bottom out cracks were features of the route and the weather was deteriorating as Guido led out a second pitch.

The second pitch was of good quality, solid blocks with square edges, good jug hauling and bridging, how ever lack of pro and the threatening weather prompted a 20 metre run out. The duo finished with a boulder route to the Summit and a wet descent to Tahurangi. Sharks Tooth- Hoffos after the Surrey Ascent.

Warwicks Castle- Steve (Doc) Smith a traverse with Guido then climbed ,Anti Climax (16) with Davo leading ,followed with an attempt on,This ones a 22.....(16) by Steve.

Mike Watembach and Chris Wheatley did the Traverse with Guido and followed up with the same on Lion Rock, Plumber looked on and gave encouraging comments.

Then the many stories started to flow and so we went there we walked for great distances, got mud on our boots and found snow of great similarity to elsewhere, amazingly the rock was also very similar.

Eager to solve the great mystery of the West side I questioned the super climber of the 1980's Warwick Humphries, and will note that no one has ever repeated his grade 26 Propagander on the Eiger Wall.

Some time ago he found and climbed an amazing 10 Pitch crag of superb quality on the West Side. Word soon spread and there was a huge up roar in climbing circles, apparently it was deemed unacceptable to have a crag of such size and quality on Mt Egmont, West Side or not.

So, without delay the crag was moved to the Southern Alps, (with DOC approval of course) and now stands proudly in the Darran Mountains. Warwick said he was extremely disappointed and immediately thought of moving the Little Eiger from the East to the West, however he never did. The reason was simple, if moved to the west side Little Eiger would grow from 50m to at least 150m, and would also have to be moved to the Darran Mountains. The Lodge Maintenance committee reported that they were investigating several cladding options in more detail. Waterproofing of known troublespots has been targeted as an essential item to be detailed or minimised. Mark is keen to speak with anyone out there who has had first hand experience with the Lodge construction and/or repairs. Tahurangi is the Club's biggest asset and money earner. The sub -committee is determined in restoring the Lodge to top condition with expert advice and sound materials and techniques.

Be advised that until you see it the downpipe on the Stratford side of the Lodge is missing and no longer assisting the roof to collect water for the water tanks. Please conserve water whenever possible.

Phillip "Charlie" Andrews reported that DOC funding had been approved for upgrading of the Manganui Gorge Track but not likely to be in time for repairs to be undertaken before the deadline of 1 June.

Quin Amoore (ph 754-4404) our new "Social Co-ordinator" is keen to here from anyone who has an idea for a "club event". He is presently working on a "paintball" challenge with other clubs.
