Trip Reports

Taranaki Snow Cave Weekend

Adventures were had and memories made during our Taranaki snow cave weekend on 27-28 August! With 13 of us in total, 6 went high into Hongis to build their cave whilst the other 7 stayed low in Hongis to build three small 2-3 person caves. The snow cave digging/construction was tougher than we thought. Yet after an afternoon of sweaty perseverance, much shovelling of snow and laughter in cold windy weather, our caves looked great with tunnel entrances, kitchenette areas for dinner, platforms for sleeping and beautifully smoothed walls to stop any drips. Once dinner was cooked, everyone settled into their many layers of thermals and sleeping bags. Despite the chilly howling wind outside in the dark night, the upper cave experienced cosy temperatures of some 4 degrees Celsius and were soon asleep about 9pm. Aaaahhhh. However, the lower caves remained awake for a while and saw that same howling wind blow huge snowdrifts into their caves - by 9.30pm their cave entrances were almost completely snowed in! So the lower caves team decided to abandon to the safety of Taurangi Lodge rather than spend the night snowed in.

Abandoning the lower caves into the dark night of such strong winds & snowdrifts was no easy feat and the team worked incredibly well together to get back safely to the lodge for a cosy night. The upper cave team woke the next morning to a completely snowed in cave entrance which took one and a half hours to dig out!

Sunday was a blue sky day and a hearty breakfast and swapping of stories back at the lodge completed our snow cave adventure. A huge thanks is extended to trip leaders Alec Heilbron and Greg Banks who made this trip happen - this was an awesome weekend and certainly one we'll want to have on our trips agenda next winter!

A full trip of 22 was unfortunately reduced to 13 when atrocious weather forced us to go for our reserve weekend of 23-25 Sept.

Well done to all of those that re-organised travel plans to make it! With increasing showers forecast as the Saturday progressed, we started early from Mangetepopo car park at 7.30am and headed into a warm yet

slightly overcast and drizzly valley toward Soda Springs and the infamous loo stop.

The weather seemed to lift a little and clothing layers were removed as we warmed up walking up Devil's Staircase. But you guessed it, those layers were back on as we reached the saddle and temperatures dropped! South Crater was very wet and slushy and as we hiked up toward Red Crater in increasing wind, rain and lowering visibility, we wondered if and when snow or ice might appear.

Finally the snow appeared, with white out conditions to accompany, and with frequently changing snow depths over a hard ice base the crampons were finally on as we headed to the summit.

White out continued at the summit and despite no views, it felt amazing to be the only people up there. After a good feed, we went down the steep deep snow slope directly into South Crater and made our way back to Mangetepopo car park.

Woah, what a day! Which was of course finished off with good food & beer in front of the fire at Tussocks. A huge thanks to our Trip Leader Scott Chamberlain who, with the help of Murray Peat and Mike Bone, helped ensure a safe trip and awesome experience for all. Next year we'll be going for Ruapehu Crater Lake as our winter weekend away - keep an eye out for dates!

TAHURANGI LODGE

This is the TAC's premier Lodge on Mt Egmont / Taranaki. It sleeps 24, has electric heating and cooking, all cutlery, pots and pans, etc. Just like home. Members can request an eKey by completing the application available from the Club's website.

Overnight fees are \$45 for non-members. Members free.

Anyone who stays at Tahurangi Lodge must write in the overnight book upstairs by the fridge;

1. Their surname and initials.

2. Say TAC or non-member.

Bookings by non-members or members taking a group of 5+ people should be made with the Lodge Booking Officer, or by booking online via the Club's website.

The lodge subcommittee looks after all maintenance. Contact the Lodge committee if you want to help, have ideas for improvements, or have found something wrong.

If you find you can't get into the Lodge because of an eKey failure or you have locked yourself out etc., phone either the Club Secretary, or the Lodge Booking Officer.

Contact info on Web page. They may be able to help by supplying the current access code.

SUBSCRIPTIONS Annual subscriptions are set at the Annual General Meeting.

Subscriptions for 2016: FAMILY \$60, ORDINARY (single) \$40, STUDENT (under 18), \$30.

The subscription halves for those joining after September 1st

Members with unpaid subs at end of April are sent an account overdue notice. If still unpaid by 1st June incur a penalty of 20%. Any members with unpaid subs at 1st July are removed from membership.

GEAR HIRE - TAC Equipment Officer:

The following equipment is available for hire by TAC Club Members:

Ice axes, ice hammers, helmets, harness (incl. karabiners, etc).

Each item costs \$5/day or a maximum of \$10/day for 2 or more items per person. Return the gear promptly after use and you only pay for the days you actually used it. Return it late and risk paying for the complete period; your choice.

A PLB (Personal Locator Beacon) is also available for hire and great for back country tramping or alpine climbing.

Contact the Equipment Officer AT LEAST 2 days in advance to ensure availability

EVENTS PROGRAMME Club nights, trips, instruction and social events are all important functions of the Club's activities – they need both support from participants as well as volunteers to lead them.

If you have suggestions for club nights contact the Club Captain, or would like to volunteer to lead a trip contact the Trips co-ordinator.
