Tracks in Egmont National Park

Kia ora koutou katoa,

Recent weather events of snow fall, rain and wind has taken its toll on the track network in the Egmont National Park. I'm asking for feedback by yourselves or your club members on the track conditions in the Egmont National Park.

I have had a number of reports of track damage already and I'm trying to get a better picture of the current situation to determine how best to resource the work ahead of us to get the tracks open to the public.

There will be work DOC staff can get onto reasonably quickly and there will be work that I will contract someone to do. The information I need fed back to me is-

- The name of the track
- Slips that have affected the track (note; is clearing of debris required to get past or has a beaten track already been established)
- Is vegetation obstructing the track (note; do I need a handsaw or chainsaw to clear it and how much of each needs to be cleared off the entire track)
- Is there any other issues on the track that I may need to know.

Winners will be announced at a special Awards Function to be held in Wellington on Monday 4th September. Keep an eye on the TAC Facebook page and website for the results.


Last year's winner in the Outstanding Event Award went to YMCA Auckland for its Family Camps, held at Camp Adair held twice a year camps since 2014..

Wow, what an epic day!

Eleven club members met at Whakapapa / Iwikau Village for 7.30am on Saturday morning. After a quick transceiver exercise to remind us how to use this important gear, we made the best of available logistics (or we cheated ha ha!) and took the two chairlifts up to Knoll Ridge cafe. With the morning cloud clearing to a bright blue sky above we headed south up Knoll Ridge, above the ski field, and then south-east to bring us up onto Te Heuheu Ridge just west of Tukino Peak. Conditions up to Te Heuheu Ridge were soft deep snow with a thin crust making sweaty work for new steps. Calm conditions below the Ridge changed to an icy wind as we climbed onto the Ridge and looked across the amazing snowscape of Summit Plateau. With a quick stop to put more gear on and keep the chill out, we walked west and then south along the ridge to the Dome. The clear weather and firmer ridge conditions offered epic scenery along the impressive ridge, culminating in lunch at Dome Shelter with the fantastic view of the steaming Crater Lake below us. That biting wind meant we didn't stop for too long and our return route took us north down Whakapapa Glacier into cloud and much reduced visibility. We finally popped out below the cloud jumped back on the chairlifts down to the carpark. A well earned dinner, a few beers, and watching the All Blacks win over the Wallabies concluded an awesome day out! A huge thanks goes to Glen Hodges for his work as Trip Leader and ensuring the trip route and safety measures were brilliantly managed. Huge thanks also to Assisting Trip Leads Scott Chamberlain, Grant Upson and Dave Clough without whom we could not make our safety ratios and enable so many club members to enjoy the mountains and improve their skills on trips like this. Remarkables Ice and Mixed Festival

Three club members (Ben, Amy, and Chris) made it down to Queenstown for the annual Remarkables Ice and Mixed Festival this August. This is an annual event organised by the Expedition Climbers' Club (who also run the NZ Alpine Team), and represents the best opportunity to get out and meet other winter climbers of all abilities in the Australasian scene. There were over 150 climbers in attendance this year, with in the order of 80 attending clinics for further instruction ranging from snow craft to leading mixed and ice terrain.

Friday night saw Australian legend Tim Macartney-Snape (of "Sea to Summit" fame) present an engaging talk on the 1984 Australian ascent of a previously unclimbed route on the north face of Mt Everest. The team climbed in a lightweight alpine style, without bottled oxygen, and without the help of high altitude porters. Tim himself was climbing in cross-country ski boots as substitutes for his high altitude climbing boots that had been lost in an earlier miscalculation in the chosen gear cache location!


On Saturday night, New Zealand's own Lydia Bradey gave a very lively presentation on acclimatisation and climbing at altitude. Don't miss out on seeing her at our November club night, when she presents on the (and her) first Kiwi ascent of Dhaulagiri (8,167m); the presentation is 7:30 pm Thursday 2nd November at Quality Hotel Plymouth International (New Plymouth), and entry is free.

September 7th


On September the 7th we have the annual "Collaborative Club Night"

Image Format:

- > Sized between 1MB and 5 MB
- > Saved as a JPEG or JPG file
- > All images must be digital...

Submitting Images:

- > Email to president.tac@outlook.com
- > Send one photo per email
- > Entries can be submitted from 1st October
- > Submit your images by Sunday 19 November

File Name

- > Must start with the Category Code, then TAC, followed by the Caption, in that order
- > e.g. "ABNH TAC Frozen Aoraki.jpeg"

The revised categories for the 2017 competition (to align to FMC) are:

- > ABOVE BUSHLINE (With no Human Element), Cat Code: ABNH
- > ABOVE BUSHLINE (With a Human Element), Cat Code: ABH
- > BELOW BUSHLINE (With no Human Element), Cat Code: BBNH

> HUMOUR, Cat Code: HUM

Conditions of Entry:

- > Adjustments for exposure, white balance, contrast & levels are allowed.
- > Cropping is allowed
- > Stitching for panoramic shots is allowed
- > Removal or insertion of features not in the original image is not allowed.
- > Entries for the contemporary categories must be taken after 1 Jan 2016. Any photos taken prior to this date will automatically be entered into the historic category.
- > What defines a "Human Element"?

"The definition of what is a "Human Element" is flexible but the general intention is: Where the photo contains as anything other than as a very minor feature: people, a hut, a track sign/marker, bridge, ice axe and anything else that has been introduced by humans into the environment then we would define that as having "a Human element". But if a photo has what could be called a Human Element but that element is very small, inconsequential and not a feature in the photo then you could count it as "No Human Element".

- > Multiple entries per category are allowed
- > The winning entries in each category will be submitted to the national FMC Photo Competition (where eligible).
- > Photo's taken outside of the New Zealand Exclusive Economic Zone (i.e. North Is, South Is, Stewart, Chatham, Kermadec, Sub-Antarctic) are permitted for the TAC competition, but are not permitted for the FMC competition
- > The humour section is TAC only (not FMC)

TAHURANGI LODGE

This is the TAC's premier Lodge on Mt Egmont / Taranaki. It sleeps 24, has electric heating and cooking, all cutlery, pots and pans, etc. Just like home. Members can request an eKey by completing the application available from the Club's website.

Overnight fees are \$45 for non-members. Members free. Anyone who stays at Tahurangi Lodge must write in the overnight book upstairs by the fridge;

- 1. Their surname and initials.
- 2. Say TAC or non-member.

Bookings by non-members or members taking a group of 5+ people should be made with the Lodge Booking Officer, or by booking online via the Club's website. The lodge subcommittee looks after all maintenance. Contact the Lodge committee if you want to help, have ideas for improvements, or have found something wrong. If you find you can't get into the Lodge because of an eKey failure or you have locked yourself out etc., phone either the Club President, or the Lodge Booking Officer. Contact info on Web page. GEAR HIRE

TAC Equipment Officer:

The following equipment is available for hire by TAC Club Members:

Ice axes, ice hammers, helmets, harness (incl. karabiners, etc.). Each item costs \$5/day or a maximum of \$10/day for 2 or more items per person. Return the gear promptly after use and you only pay for the days you actually used it. Return it late and risk paying for the complete period; your choice. A PLB (Personal Locator Beacon) is also available for hire and great for back country tramping or alpine climbing. We also have (new) 6mm Prussic Cord for sale to club members at \$2 per meter. Contact the Equipment Officer AT LEAST 2 days in advance to ensure availability.
