Trip Report - National Parks Experience

The weather was less than perfect, but we still had a good time, not least because of staying at Forest & Bird's Ruapehu Lodge. Multiple bunk rooms, spacious and well equipped kitchen and living areas, and exclusive use. And because it was made available to any club member to use for the weekend, not just those on the official trip, twenty two or so came

long, so there were good social opportunities as well.

7 September

Despite the misty start to Saturday and a forecast of rain for most of the day and wind later, most of the 'official' group braved the weather and set off for Tama Lakes, a wise decision given how bad the conditions were likely to be higher up. No snow for us today! No views beyond about 20 metres either, as we wound our way up and down and around the tussock, Dracophyllum, snow totara and other above-the-treeline vegetation, past the top of the Taranaki Falls, and up to the Lower Tama Lake. I'd not seen the lakes before, and I still haven't. Phil and I ventured to the edge of the steep drop off and we looked down into ... mist.

The wind had started to get up by now, blowing the drizzle at us, so after a huddle and a quick team photo by the sign we turned back. No point risking hypothermia just to say we'd got to the viewpoint for Upper Tama Lake. There definitely wasn't going to be a view!

At the Falls, we took the lower track and appreciated the shelter of the bush and the respite from the wind and rain. Our bedraggled gaggle of ten got back to the Lodge at about 12:30 after a 4.5 hour outing, having walked 17km (according to someone's app).

The Lodge drying room was soon cluttered with wet gear. Although nowhere near as effective as Tahurangi's, it did a passable job.

8 September

Sunday dawned fine, with a view from the Lodge of the upper slopes of Ruapehu shining in the sun, and fifteen of us drove up to the Top of the Bruce planning to catch the gondola up at 9am before we started our walk. Not so fast! It wasn't open yet, and if they did open it, it wouldn't be until 10am. Nothing for it but to walk up. We took the route under the gondola, which Greg and Lynda had done a few days prior. After being blasted by tiny ice particles from numerous snowmakers along the way, crampons went on before a particularly icy patch. Instruction starts now: check to see that they're on properly, and check each other's crampons; remember to walk with wide apart feet, as if you're riding a horse (or...). And how about those clothing layers? All good, or do you need to add or subtract?

Along with Steven, Glenys and Mohammed as our official leads, the group also included several other more experienced people, so there was a good ratio of experienced to less experienced. We found some steeper slopes with good runouts, safe for practicing on, e.g. our 'one, two, three' walk, along with step cutting practice on a slope untouched by the snow groomer, and, because the ski field was closed (plus the snow cover not going all the way to the bottom), no need to keep a lookout for skiers or snowboarders hurtling past.

The sun was shining, and although there was a wind, it wasn't too bad. Up we went, until the smell of hot chips wafted by from the Knoll Ridge Café, tempting some and perhaps putting a spring in the steps, especially once we could see the café above us. But it was not to be: time restrictions kept us on task and from the top of the gondola / café area it was on up and off to the west to Delta Corner. Somewhere along the way, we lost the sun completely.

We had a bit of serious fun looking for and finding a buried avalanche transceiver, by walking one step at a time in a line up the slope and then across it. After this, we were instructed to find our own line up the slope, more or less under the line of the Knoll Ridge T-bar, avoiding the small snow-covered gully which had water running into it at the top, and hence the potential to fall in a hole without warning.

Just as the weather started to really clag in, we gathered under the T-bar for photos, before a rapid but careful descent, shielding our faces from the ice crystals being driven at us by the now strong westerly wind.

Back at the top of the gondola, crampons off, and on we hopped for a smooth ride down. It was a relief to get out of that weather.

Thanks Steven, Glenys, Mohammed, Phil and Greg for all your guidance and Clarissa for the planning and support.

Trip Report - National Parks Experience

Despite the unfavourable weather forecast, there was a good turnout for this trip; kudos to the trip co-ordinators, who seamlessly managed all the cancellations and last minute bookings.

Our accommodation was "Forest and Bird" Lodge - just up the road from Whakapapa village, and this was a well appointed, new, warm and spacious building nestled in the bush, away from the main road. Thanks to Janeke and Barbara who are F&B members for helping TAC with securing this booking.

How do a group of hardy TAC members cope with a dreadful forecast? Wet weather gear testing.

Thus on Saturday morning we brightened the track to Tama lakes with technicolour raincoats and pack covers. Others opted for the shelter afforded by the bush with a walk to Silica Ranids.

We reached a sign that indicated we were at Lower Tama Lake (previous experience tells me the sign was correct, despite no lake being visible.)

Beyond that, exposed conditions and a strong wind, combined with the prediction that Upper Tama Lake would be equally invisible, led us to head back to the comfort of the Lodge with hot showers and a drying room.

We took a slightly different route, past Taranaki Falls, rapids, and then through bush alongside the stream, back in time for lunch.

With an afternoon to kill, some of us went indoor Rock Climbing at the nearby YHA in National Park, while others had a yoga session led by Glenys.

Sunday's forecast was more favourable, and getting some time on the snow was now possible.

The plan had been to take the earliest Sky Waka to the snow (9 am departure) - however, on arrival learned that it would not be operating till 10 am due to, I suspect, some mild wind.

There were some patches of snow on the road, so we set off on foot - practicing walking in our boots - there were some icy patches, and testing our gear again as the road led us into the path of several operating snow machines.

In one spot there was even a tiny snow bridge to cross - it handled the weight (individually) of all members of our party.

Further up we did the compulsory ``step cutting and snow bucket cutting'' - no TAC trip is complete without doing these activities!

Hot chocolate at the top of the gondola sounded very tempting - but our trip leaders were keen for us to have maximal time in the snow, so we ate our lunches outside, entertained by watching an avalanche rescue dog demonstration.

We ascended a little higher - and did practice finding a hidden transceiver. Ella was successful but our trip leader did not have any dog treats for her.

We did some more climbing - then the essential part of any climb - descent, initially walking down the slopes then catching the gondola just as the weather turned nasty.

A big thank you to Steve, Greg, Glenys and Mohammad for all their instruction and support during an enjoyable and successful weekend.

Buddy Walks

Are you new to winter mountaineering and unsure how to gain winter experience? The Club's buddy walks can help you!

- Our buddy walks help fill two key gaps for those who are pretty new to winter mountaineering: acquiring skills and being able to safely climb and walk on Taranaki's winter white stuff, as well as getting to know
- The buddy walks are informal, friendly and typically aimed at those wishing to improve their beginner/basic snow travel skills (ice axe, crampons, weather/snow conditions assessment, different terrain/slopes, maybe
- simple pitching) with a more experienced person.

 The emphasis is on 'buddy', i.e. the buddy does not take complete responsibility for participants' safety. The buddy is there to share knowledge and help participants make mutually agreed reasoned risk judgements.
- Participants are required to have the necessary equipment. See below for hire details
- Participants must have done a Snowcraft One course or have mountaineering skills at least to that level, i.e. know how to use an ice axe and crampons.
- These walks are weather and snow condition dependent. If the weather is bad on Saturday the trip could be changed to Sunday.

 A consent form will be shared prior to the walk. The walk duration, skill level, and fitness required will be advertised prior to the walk. The consent form helps us tailor the walks to suit.
- Communications will be via WhatsApp. If you are interested in going on a Buddy Walk this season, please contact Stephen Miller on 027 244 2753 well before the walk and you will be added to the WhatsApp group. Experienced leaders required! Please consider helping as we can do with some extra helpers and leaders.
